Women's Employability and Basic Skills Project

The first project we want to put the spotlight on is Hasina and her valuable employability project. Within this work, Hasina strives to make volunteering opportunities more accessible for ethnic minority women in Tameside. This helps women gain new skills, feel less isolated, grow their networks and improve their wellbeing. Service users have then used these voluntary opportunities to gain practical skills that lead to employment. Last year, all the women who engaged in the project reported a 100% increase in being access to opportunities along with the ability to connect with others, which is amazing!
